- Surrey's data [full data report](#) is published every Friday. This includes case rates, VOCs and vaccinations
- [National data](#) on testing, cases, vaccine, deaths is updated daily, now also available in easy-read version
- In the UK, up to 5 July **178,128** people tested positive in last 7 days, an increase of 53.2%, with **128** deaths within 28 days of a positive test between 29 and 5 July, an increase of 6 (4.9%) from previous 7 days
- 1st vaccine doses – **45,351,719** (86.1% of population)
- 2nd vaccine doses – **33,726,362** (64.0% of population)
- [R number](#) for England is **1.1-1.3**, daily infection growth rate range of **+2% to +5%**, as of 2 July

Key Message: Most restrictions set to end in England on 19 July

Most legal restrictions to control COVID-19 will be lifted when England enters step 4 of the Government's roadmap on 19 July. An announcement confirming this is expected on 12 July

This means there will no longer be:

- A requirement to stay 2 metres apart from people you do not live with
- A limit on the number of people you can meet
- An expectation for people to work from home
- A requirement to wear face coverings in any setting
- A limit on the number of people who can attend weddings, civil partnerships, funerals and other life events
- A limit on the group sizes attending communal worship

On 19 July the use of COVID bubbles in schools, colleges and early years settings will also end

Self-isolation to be eased for fully vaccinated adults in step 4:

- From 16 August, people who have had both doses of the vaccine and under 18s will no longer need to self-isolate if they are identified as a close contact of someone with COVID-19
- Anyone who tests positive for COVID-19 **will still be required** to self-isolate.

COVID-19 Vaccinations

- Vaccines are the way out of this pandemic.

 - even more unlikely to get serious COVID-19, to be admitted to hospital, or to die from it
 - less likely to pass the virus to others
